#### **Hazard Light Misuse Across States**

Many U.S. states strictly regulate when drivers may use hazard lights. These restrictions exist because flashing hazards can obscure brake-light signals and create confusion for other drivers—especially during inclement weather or emergency situations.



#### Florida's 2021 Exception

In 2021, Florida diverged from most states by expanding the permissible use of hazard lights while a vehicle is in motion. Under the updated law, hazard lights may be used in two situations:

#### **Severe Weather and Low Visibility**

Drivers may activate hazard lights while moving when visibility is extremely limited—such as during heavy rain, fog, or smoke—but only on roads with speed limits of 55 mph or higher. The goal is to increase vehicle visibility during dangerous conditions common in Florida.

#### **Funeral Processions**

Vehicles participating in a funeral procession may use hazard lights to help signal their involvement and maintain procession integrity.

#### TRAITS ARE NOT TELLING

I recently had the opportunity to speak about police perceptions and the false aesthetics that continue to permeate public discourse. Public debate often focuses on the "militarization" of police, yet the satire of that term becomes clear when you examine it more closely. Our military—by and large—is well-trained, disciplined, and operates within a structured system of principles. In fact, many of the foundational concepts of modern American law enforcement trace back to Sir Robert Peel's principles, which emphasize professionalism, order, and disciplined service.

The modern image of militarized policing is often traced to events like the Watts riots, the rise of the Black Panthers, and the Texas Tower shooting. These crises prompted agencies to consider how former military-trained personnel might be used to form rapid, specialized response teams—what would eventually become Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT). Over time, boot-camp-style training, formal rank structures, standard-ized uniforms, and the symbolic accounterments of law enforcement helped shape a professional identity that is easily misinterpreted.

Police officers today perform a diverse range of roles, but they are typically issued a single standardized uniform and equipment set, worn across all environments. This uniformity—combined with the stoic demeanor encouraged for officer safety—often leads to perceptions of aggression or intimidation. In truth, officers frequently face no-win situations, where someone will resent them regardless of the decision they make.

Their habits of hyper-vigilance—avoiding having their backs exposed to strangers or doorways, constantly scanning for distractions or threats, and reading subtle cues that most people overlook—are not personality quirks but occupational necessities. Depending on the nature of their work, these traits can become deeply ingrained. And while the public may rarely see the toll of the "bad stuff," families often don't hear those stories either; officers commonly shield their loved ones from that part of the job.

Most families understand the traits that law enforcement officers display even after retirement, but many people outside that circle do not. As a result, they may judge an officer as arrogant rather than recognizing the experiences that shaped them. Many officers choose not to discuss their past, and some even seek out new friendships outside the law-enforcement community as a way to reconnect with a more "normal" view of society.

Regardless of the path they take, the stressors of our past do not define who we are today. During my speaking engagement in April, I was surprised by how many attendees had little understanding of the traits commonly seen in police officers. Though the Blue Knights are founded in law enforcement, what brings us together is the open road, shared purpose, and the respect we carry for those who serve and those who have served. We ride not to boast, but to honor the journey that shaped us.

# THE NOAA CORPS Part 3 of 3: HISTORY

The earlier articles in this series covered the NOAA Corps and its history. But, as we all know, the true nature of an organization is realized by living it.

As with all organizations, there is so much more to being an officer with the NOAA Corps than what official summaries provide. For example, there are no enlisted personnel aboard ships. Wage marine personnel make up the crew. All positions from Chief to deckhand are civilians. Officers manage ship operations and serve as deck officers navigating and maneuvering the ship.... Ship drivers.

Officers rotate ashore after serving a two to three-year sea tour. They assume field and management duties throughout NOAA as needed and rotate back to sea-duty. It is a sea going career. Unless an officer <u>is assigned</u> to the flight program (Hurricane Hunters and nautical charting, etc), they will be serving sea-duty throughout their career.

The civilian crew, on the other hand, stay with the ship until they request reassignment, quit, or retire. This unique environment requires a distinctive style of leadership, especially when you are a junior officer. It is more of a negotiation unless there are safety concerns.



My time underway with the NOAA Corps was short but impactful. I served two years (mid-1988 to mid-1990) aboard a 210 ft. fisheries research ship, NOAA Ship Miller Freeman, assigned to the North Pacific and Bearig Sea. We homeported out of Seattle, WA, but spent most of our time around Kodiak and Dutch Harbor, AK, with sometime in the Bearing Sea. We also made intermittent cruises down the west coast and one to Hawaii.

We were underway <u>roughly 243</u> days a year taking various scientific groups out from 21 to 30+ days. We usually only spent three days at the most in port to change out scientific crews. Bridge personnel worked 4-hour watches with 8 hours off while underway. Officers had collateral duties which kept them busy while not on watch. There was little down time.



Weather was a factor in all aspects of life on the ship. We <u>operated</u> in seas from choppy, to rough, to nasty quite a bit It is hard to describe the fatigue which comes from living in an ever-moving environment. When in rough weather just standing requires an entire body effort in order not to topple on to the deck. I found out quickly why our passageways were so narrow. Any wider and you could not bounce back and forth to keep upright as you worked your way to your destination.

Sleeping was equally challenging. We stuffed any item we could under the edges of the mattress to form it into a U-shape to keep from flopping back and forth as the ship rolled. Unfortunately, you could not do much about pitching as the ship rode over each wave lifting the bow followed by the stern. Honestly, you were so tired from counteracting the ship's

motion and dealing with split watches day after day, your body just shut down despite being bounced around in the bunk.





As far as being a ship driver, it was a great ship. Unlike the nautical charting ships in the fleet which cruised to their sites and anchored, the Miller Freeman constantly moved from collection site to collection site. Once at a survey site, the ship had to be maneuvered to set the various types of collection equipment the scientists used, such as a stern trawl, plankton tows, and a water column data collection device called a CTD Cast. You had to learn ship handling quickly.

The ship also supported hydroacoustic field trials, launched current buoys, and provided a ride for marine mammal scientists to do surveys of marine mammals in the Pacific. Miller Freeman was one of the most active ships in the NOAA fleet.

The Miller Freeman was minimally crewed, so actual maneuvering the ship <u>was done</u> by the officers. As a deck officer, I had to keep the ship on course and at the right speed regardless of the sea state for the type of equipment we had in the water, help keep a lookout for other ships and navigate to the next collection site. It could get quite sporty on the bridge.

There certainly were horrible days on the ship when the weather became too rough to conduct operations. I was prone to seasickness which made those times so much more special, especially considering there was no calling in sick. You had to stand your watch and just deal with it.

On the other hand, I <u>was blessed</u> with being able to experience the majestic nature of the Pacific and Bering Sea that few will ever <u>have the opportunity to encounter</u> without being aboard a ship. There were Killer whale pods, Dall's porpoises swimming in our bow wave, bioluminescence life stirred up in our wake, and the Northern Lights on the occassional clear night. However, the most notable event occurred on a midnight watch in the middle of the Pacific.

It was one of those unusually calm nights. We were underway to set up marine mammal surveying in the morning. I stepped out on the bridge wing to take a moment to get some fresh air and look for any ship lights on the horizon. The night was clear, and I could see stars from horizon to horizon as bright as any stars I have ever seen while on land, as there were no city lights competing with the night sky. It was both spectacular and yet made me feel very small on that little ship so far from shore.

Like many in law enforcement with tales of their past, bunking on a ship created many memories worthy of telling, but I can save those for when we are sitting around trading stories. I will end with the fact that my time serving on Miller Freeman taught me I was not meant for a life at sea. However, I would never have had the opportunity to join NO-AA's Officer of Enforcement if it were not for my service in the NOAA Corp. For that I will always be grateful.
